WHERE: All events will be held at the Emma Kelly Theater, Averitt Center for the Arts, 33 East Main Street, Statesboro (http://www.averittcenterforthearts.org/) except the October 4 which will held at the Carter Recital Hall, Foy Music Building, Georgia Southern University (http://class.georgiasouthern.edu/music/).

WHY: The six-week program series features documentary film screenings and discussions of twentieth-century American popular music led by Dr. Michael Braz, assisted by community members knowledgeable in specific musical genres. The six sessions focus on the uniquely American musical genres: blues and gospel, Broadway, jazz, bluegrass and country, rock 'n' roll, and mambo and hip hop.

Zach S. Henderson Library is one of fifty sites nationwide to host this program series, which is a project by the Tribeca Film Institute in collaboration with the American Library Association, Tribeca Flashpoint, and the Society for American Music. "America's Music" has been made possible by a major grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities: Exploring the Human Endeavor. "America's Music: A Film History of Our Popular Music from Blues to Bluegrass to Broadway" uses a mixture of films and scholar-led discussions to illuminate the audience's understanding of American culture.
